Neurodiversity Celebration Week

This week (13th -19th March) is Neurodiversity Celebration Week, a worldwide initiative that challenges stereotypes and misconceptions about neurological differences. It aims to transform how neurodivergent people are perceived and supported and gives us the opportunity to recognise the many talents and advantages of being neurodivergent.

Neurodiversity Celebration Week will be hosting a series of free online events on a range of subjects, such as the experiences of neurodivergent women and girls and neurodiversity in the workplace, criminal justice and culture. You will need to register and many will be repeated at different times over the week, including events for parents and carers.

Rights Respecting at Brindishe Schools – Article of the week

Article 35

Governments must protect children from being abducted, sold or moved illegally to a different place in or outside their country for the purpose of exploitation.

At Brindishe Schools we teach children that abduction, sale and trafficking of children is rare, but it is still important they know how to keep themselves safe and know who to talk to if they think themselves or a friend is at risk.

Ask your child: How do you keep yourself safe at home, at school and in the community?

Did they say any of these?

- By making sure adults know where you are.
- By being supervised by adults at home, school or during activities.
- By thinking about staying safe online.
- By making sure you have safe travel plans in place when socialising.
- By considering risks when you do things.
- Parents and carers arrange for us to be looked after when they can't.
- Teachers and other staff in school keep us safe during the day and make sure we know who we can talk to if we are worried.
- Police officers make sure that we are safe within our communities. If someone is in danger, they will support them.
- Social workers can support children who need extra help to stay safe.

Look at the resources from <u>Clever Never Goes</u> which help you to think through how to stay safe in different situations. This resource is for adults working with children, young people and families to educated and inform on avoiding abduction.

Itsme is a socialising app that is used to make friends through text, voice and video chats as well as Snapchat. This app is rated as 18+ and is not suitable for children. Itsme allows users to meet/ chat as their avatar. Users will be chatting with strangers, which can present risks.
