As it's that time of year where you may be looking to make some extra space in your cupboards, we're asking for donations for any board games that may be collecting dust at home.

Research on brain development has prominently pointed to the importance of executive function, which is the brain's ability to problem solve, be creative, utilize working memory and take prior knowledge and adapt it to new situations. Playing board games is just one way to tap into this mindset, as they are fun, engaging and have properties that help boost children's brain power too.

Free-Play

This allows for imagination, creativity, and problem.

Follow the Rules

Board games represent a low-risk entry point to reinforce the importance of following the rules. These classics are rule-based by nature and require specific actions to achieve a set goal.

Be Adaptable

Board games are subject to chance and the actions of the other players, making it paramount for players to think on their feet.

Engaged children must learn the rules, develop a strategy, prioritize resources, adapt to changes in situations, negotiate and collaborate, maximize opportunity and minimize risk, and achieve the goal faster than competitors.

This week's learning at Brindishe Lee...

We used our phonics to make reading and writing sentences like 'go and pat the dog.' We've also made some Xmas things to go home!

Reception

In maths, we've learnt subtraction with numbers up to 20! We've also done some breath-taking art - we drew the Aurora Borealis using chalks. Very pretty and calming!

Year 1 Magnolia

We've concentrated on minus and take away in maths. You put the biggest number first and take away the smaller one. We've also been doing lots of acts of kindness for each other.

Year 1 Sycamore

We learnt how glass is made: from sand and the rock, lime. We've also written the first paragraph of *Little Red Riding Hood*. We would've ignored that wolf!

Year 2

This week, we've written paragraphs about what makes us unique, which includes things we like and dislike, our opinions and what things we do everyday.

Year 3

We studied Tudor clothes: we took our photo, chopped off our head (very Tudor) and drew on Tudor style clothes! Men wore leggings and ruffs; women wore corsets to keep thin!

Year 4

In maths, we've studied equivalent fractions: one half can be 1 over 2 or 4 over 8. We've also studied the phases of the moons, such as gibbous moon and waxing and waning.

Year 5 Willow

In English, we've been writing stories about robots. We also did our Christmas play - no one liked Scrooge! We had amazing costumes and our hard work shone through!

Year 5 Cherry

This week, we've been doing a lot of work related to our Xmas play. We've practised and performed, and we've written descriptive words and phrases about Scrooge from *A Christmas Carol*.

Year 6

Our Environment correspondent has asked that Brindishe Lee pupils and families please save their plastic bottles over the Christmas period for an outdoor project planned for the New Year! Repurposing plastic bottles will prevent plastic litter whilst also helping the environment with our fantastic idea! Please, just make sure to rinse them thoroughly!
