In class this week...

Each week we will continue to share with you what each year group has been focusing on in class and offer some ideas on how you can support your child over the coming week.

Nursery

Welcome back! It's been great hearing about what the children have been up to over the Easter break. Please remember to add pictures, tickets and drawings to their 'Me Books' to share with the class. As the weather starts to warm up (hopefully), please can we ask that your child is wearing suitable clothing and footwear. Please make sure your child's toes and shoulders are covered. Additionally, please check your child has spare clothes on their pegs to change into when necessary.

Reception

Reception children have come back very refreshed after Easter and settled in very well. As the weather is getting warmer we advise parents and carers to dress children accordingly; sandals are fine as long as they are not open-toed, sunhats are recommended and children's shoulders shouldn't be exposed. Please also start bringing children's P.E kits back to school. A big thank you to the parents and carers who supported us in our trip to Manor House Gardens before Easter - the children had a great time. We are very excited to announce that next week Reception children will be baking bug biscuits daily. They'll be selling them at the end of each day in the Reception playground for 50p each.

<u>Year 1</u>

Year 1 have continued their learning on place value this week. The children have been comparing two numbers up to 20 by looking at the tens column first and then the ones. From this, the children were able to compare the numbers using the terms 'greater/smaller/more/fewer than' before using the objects to then count and see the difference. To practise this at home, you can easily make a place value chart by splitting the paper in the middle and labelling the tens (left side) and ones column (right side). Can they compare two-digit numbers up 20? Are they looking and comparing the tens column first before the ones? Can they compare and say how many more/less than each given number?

In Literacy, the children have been busy planning and writing their instructions for how to catch a rabbit, how to make fruit kebabs and games that they have designed. The children are making sure that they have included features such as titles, introductions and imperative 'bossy' verbs in their instructions that they are currently publishing.

Year 1 had a lovely time at the National Gallery learning all about landscapes, animals and plants through their study of famous paintings. The children were very inspired and are all excited to learn more about plants and develop their art skills and techniques through different media. Thank you so much for all the adults that helped on the day, we really appreciate it!

<u>Year 2</u>

It was lovely to see all the Year 2 children back and well rested after the Easter break. We have started the summer term and our new topic - 'Twisted Tales' with books by Mini Grey. Ruby class is reading 'The Pea and the Princess' and Amethyst class is reading 'The Last Wolf'. The books are our creative entry point for writing and drama activities.

In Maths, children in Ruby class are learning about finding fractions of sets and children in Amethyst are working on problem solving.

Ruby class continued their investigation about plastic containers, trying to find out which of the containers could squirt the furthest (in case of a fire).

At home we would like children to practise telling time using the analogue clock. We are looking for 'telling the time' champions!

<u>Year 3</u>

Year 3 have had a fantastic start to the term, the children have come back full of enthusiasm! In Literacy this week we have been using our inferential skills to write a story about a picture. We thought about different ways we can draw the reader in, how we can describe the characters and settings and how we can keep the reader engaged. In maths this week, we have been comparing lengths. To do this we have had to convert between millimetres, centimetres and metres. We then moved onto using scales to measure the mass of various objects around our classroom.

<u>Year 4</u>

What a fantastic first week back, the children are as enthusiastic as ever for the start of the summer term.

Our topic this term will be 'Local History'. We will be looking at the history of Hither Green and the history of our school. You could do some research into the history of our local area whether it is Hither Green or somewhere else in South East London.

In maths, we will be focusing on decimals. We will be begin by looking at tenths and hundredths. A great way to support your child at home with this is to look at money, for example how $\pounds 1$ is made up of 10 lots of 10p so 10p is one tenth of $\pounds 1$.

In Literacy, we have been concentrating on persuasive writing and how we can persuade the reader to be on-board with our opinion or decision. If your child is asking for something over the weekend, 'Can I have an ice cream?' maybe you could ask them to write a persuasive speech to justify what they are asking for!

<u>Year 5</u>

Year 5 have thrown themselves into our topic of 'Space' enthusiastically. We have started to recreate a class version of the solar system using papier mache. The class have worked really well in teams to do this and we hope to complete them next week and use them for Science.

English, Science, Topic and ICT are closely linked this term; the children are working in pairs to create their own fact file about a particular planet. They have started the initial research and will then write up the different sections during English lessons before publishing them in Word.

We have changed the way that we teach Maths this term. Miss Coupe and Miss Blackie are working across the Year group together to support the children according to their individual needs. We have been so impressed with how they have moved across the year group without fuss and continued to challenge themselves and support others.

It is our turn for the 'Daily Mile'. The children are running/walking continuously for 12 minutes every morning and recording how many laps they have completed. We are linking this with their well-being and recording how we feel before and after the run. Over the coming term, ask your children if they have noticed any differences in their fitness and well-being.

<u>Year 6</u>

Year 6 have had a great start to the summer term so far - it's been wonderful to see how focused and enthusiastic they are after what's hopefully been a very restful break! This week, we've continued with our learning theme "Things That Go Bump in the Night" and this time we're focusing on the novel "Frankenstein" by Mary Shelley. We've been reading abridged versions of this book in class, using it to help us develop our reading comprehension skills in the run up to SATs. We've mostly looked at questions involving inference and vocabulary so far. There are many film versions of Frankenstein, some which are suitable for children. It may be worthwhile to watch one of these at home to help them better understand the plot of the book, or to visit the library and see if there are any other suitable versions of the story that they may enjoy.
